**Roberto Bagnoli** is a master teacher of international folk dance with a specialization in traditional and modern Israeli, Balkan, Italian, and Contra dances.

In 2000 he co-directed and choreographed the performance "Mazal Tov" (Israeli dances). A few years later, he founded the association "Folk Atelier Reggio Emilia", dedicated to preserving and promoting folk dance and other folk arts. The association is responsible for dance classes throughout Italy, and Roberto himself teaches weekly classes in several cities.

Roberto is the director of two highly successful camps in Italy each year: Balkanot (Israeli and Balkan) every January and Camp Yofi (Israeli), in July.

Roberto conducts workshops and seminars throughout Europe, Canada, Japan, Hong Kong, Singapore, Taiwan, and the United States, and has been on the teaching staff of Stockton International Dance Camp for six years.

# **BEST TRAVELING DIRECTIONS BY CAR:**

YWCA Princeton is located at the corner of US Route 206 and Paul Robeson Place, near the heart of downtown Princeton. The YWCA has an ample parking lot, accessible from Paul Robeson Place.

#### From New Brunswick / North Jersey

Take Route 27 (Nassau Street) south to its end at US Route 206 (traffic light). Turn right at the traffic light and proceed north on Route 206 (here called Bayard Lane). At the first traffic light, turn right onto Paul Robeson Place. The YWCA will be on your left. Take the second driveway into the large parking lot. Park, then follow signs to the workshop venue.

#### From Somerville / North Jersey

Approach Princeton on US Route 206 going south. At the intersection of Route 206 and Paul Robeson Place (traffic light), turn left onto Paul Robeson Place. The YWCA will be on your left. Take the second driveway into the large parking lot. Park, then follow signs to the workshop venue.

# From Philadelphia / South Jersey

Take exit 69A off I-295 in Lawrenceville, NJ, and follow Route 206 north for about 5 miles to the intersection with Route 27 (Nassau Street) (traffic light). Turn left onto 206 North (here called Bayard Lane). At the first traffic light, turn right onto Paul Robeson Place. The YWCA will be on your left. Take the second driveway into the large parking lot. Park, then follow signs to the workshop venue.

# BY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION:

- TRAIN: NJ TRANSIT and Amtrak operate trains along the Northeast Corridor rail line that stop at Princeton Junction. Transfer to the single-car train operated by NJ TRANSIT, known locally as the "Dinky," for the five-minute ride to the Princeton train station. The train station is located on Alexander Street at the southern end of Princeton University campus, about a 1-mile walk or taxi ride to the YWCA. Walking: put the train station behind you and walk north toward the McCarter Theater Center. Continue up University Place to Nassau Street. Turn left. Follow Nassau Street to the intersection with Route 206 (traffic light). Cross Nassau Street then proceed as in \* below.
- BUS: NJ TRANSIT and Coach Suburban Transit operate buses that stop at Palmer Square on Nassau Street in Princeton. Palmer Square is about a half-mile from the YWCA. Put the News Kiosk behind you and face the Nassau Presbyterian Church. Turn right on Nassau Street and walk to the corner of Nassau Street and Route 206. \*Proceed north on Route 206 (here called Bayard Lane) to Paul Robeson Place. Cross the street and turn right. The YWCA will be on your left. Walk to the first driveway on your left. Continue along this driveway then turn left. Follow signs to the workshop venue.
